Should either of these be unavailable and you have an urgent safeguarding concern, please ask for the other Deputy Designated Safeguarding Leads, Mr Collins (KS3), Mr Bedford (KS4) or Mr Taylor (KS5).

If students/parents have any concern about a safeguarding issue that they would like to report anonymously they can use the SHARP system on the Chestnut Grove Academy website. This is a link which enables an email to be sent into Chestnut Grove Academy reporting any issue. This comes to the school and will be followed up by the appropriate member of the pastoral team depending on the concern.

We've got some excellent news to share from schools within the Wandle Learning Trust this half term. At Chestnut Grove Academy our Head Student has been offered a place at Brasenose College University of Oxford to read Spanish and Beginners' German. Just 20 per cent of students who apply to study at Brasenose are offered a place, so this really is a great achievement. Chestnut Grove has also seen two of its students reach the final of the Wandsworth Young Musician of the Year competition, resulting in awards for their piano and saxophone performances respectively.

We're really pleased to let you know that Paxton Academy's new building is moving ever closer to opening. At our parents' and governors' meeting at the start of February we announced our plan to take some parents from each year group to see the building. We will be sharing more details about that after the half term.

Meanwhile Chesterton Primary has had a visit from Education Ministers from Singapore. Chesterton was asked to host the visit by the Department for Education as the Ministers wanted to see examples of excellent Early Years and Key Stage 1 provision.

FINANCE UPDATE FROM THE LOCAL ACADEMY COMMITTEE



A core role of the governing body of any school is to ensure that the finances of the school are responsibly managed and that the funds received are spent in a way that provides the best possible education for your children. We take our responsibilities in this area very seriously and have specifically recruited members to our Local Academy Committee with accountancy and finance experience to help us do that. We operate through a Local Academy Resources Committee which works closely with the school finance staff and leadership, as well as with the chair of the Local Academy Committee. We operate under the umbrella of the Wandle Learning Trust which is responsible for the financial management of all the schools in the trust.

In the 2019/20 academic year Chestnut Grove Academy received around £8 million in funding. Most of this comes from the Department for Education (DfE), mainly as a general grant based on the number of pupils we have with some additional funding for pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds and for those with special educational needs. We also generate income from fundraising through the great work of our development manager, Sharon Noble, as well as from renting out facilities out of school hours, e.g. our 3G pitches and sports halls.

Over 75% of the cost of running the school is the cost of our excellent teaching and support staff (including pay and pension contributions), a total bill of around £6.2 million per academic year. The rest of our cost base is all the other costs of running a school including curriculum resources (e.g. books, IT), facilities expenses (e.g. heating, maintenance), and management costs (e.g. human resources, financial control). Most of these are delivered in house, but some are bought in from Wandsworth Local Authority and some delivered centrally in shared functions through the Wandle Learning Trust.

Since 2011, when it became an academy, Chestnut Grove has worked hard to build up reserves which it has then spent on important projects or operating priorities that were not covered by our normal funding sources. Examples include the significant amount of furniture and equipment that was required for the new buildings and a contribution to refurbishment of the art rooms. In 2019/20 we are using some reserves to maintain levels of staffing at a time of significant staff cost inflation and school growth, as well as to finish off some important projects related to the new build including creating some more much-needed outdoor seating and catering capacity outside the canteen.

Looking forward, we are optimistic about the financial situation of Chestnut Grove. The school is growing – three years ago Wandsworth asked Chestnut Grove to move up to a six-class entry in each year (180 children) and as that flows through the school the total number of students continues to grow. Our highly successful Sixth Form is also growing as it attracts and retains more young people. This growth means that our total income levels continue to increase, providing us with additional funding to direct at resources for our students. While we are continuing to recruit teachers to teach these extra children, there is real benefit to the overall financial situation of the school of just being a little bigger. We are also about to embark on a significant building project which will be largely funded by the Department for Education (DFE) which will provide us with extra space for our growing school. We are also hoping that for the first time in several years we are going to see real increases in funding per pupil from the DFE as government policy in this area does seem to be shifting.

Overall, as a Local Academy Committee, we take the responsibility of keeping Chestnut Grove on a firm financial footing very seriously. We think the school is prudently managed and financially secure and are optimistic that we are in a position to continue to fund an outstanding education for your children.

Indoor Cricket

Last week both the Year 8 and Year 10 teams took part in the Surrey C.C. indoor cricket competition. Unfortunately, this year due to renovations taking place at the Oval the competition was held at Ernest Bevin.

The Year 8 team were drawn in pool B alongside Kingsdale, Charter School and Ernest Bevin. The first was a comfortable victory against Charter. In the second match Ernest Bevin scored a massive total of 63 which Chestnut Grove were unable to chase down, but did manage not to get bowled out. The final group game required Chestnut Grove to win and to take all six wickets in the process. Setting 38 to win, another excellent bowling performance was produced taking two Kingsdale wickets in the first over. Some excellent counter attacking batting turned the game until two suicidal runouts and an excellent catch turned the match towards Chestnut's favour. In the final over Chestnut needed one wicket and Kingsdale needed nine runs, an excellent catch on the back wall off the second ball of the over meant Chestnut won the match and advanced to the final. The final was a very close affair with Bishop Thomas Grant winning the toss and batting first scoring 52 runs. In reply, the team got off to an excellent start scoring 23 from the first two overs. A combination of tight bowling and poor shot selection saw Chestnut throw away wickets trying to maintain the big hitting, eventually being bowled out 10 runs short with an over remaining.

The Year 10 competition was a round robin format and Chestnut Grove eased past Charter School in their first match. In match two Chestnut came out narrow winners needing three runs off the final ball against Ashcroft. In match three against Bishop Thomas Grant, we limited them to 23 runs by excellent bowling and fielding allowing a convincing run chase within three overs. The final match saw the two undefeated teams, Chestnut Grove and Ernest Bevin face each other. Ernest Bevin batted first. Their first three batters all reached 25, setting a mammoth 98 runs to win the competition. Ernest Bevin's bowling was as strong as their batting, restricting Chestnut to 36 runs, being bowled out with one over of their allocation remaining.

Overall both teams performed excellently on the day and have announced themselves as the teams to beat for the Last Man Stands hardball tournament in the summer term. Congratulations to all involved.

Before half term A level students went to Cervantes Theatre to see “La Casa de Bernarda Alba” (“The House of Bernarda Alba”) by Federico García Lorca. As part of their Spanish course students have to read this play and write an essay about it in their final writing exam.

“La Casa de Bernarda Alba” explores themes of repression, passion and conformity through the depiction of a matriarch’s domination of her five daughters. Described by the author as “a drama of women in villages of Spain”, it shows us the harsh reality of women in Spain during the 1930s.

Federico García Lorca (1898-1936), poet and dramatist, was one of the greatest Spanish writers of the 20th century. He was killed by nationalist partisans at the age of thirty-eight at the beginning of the Spanish Civil war, two months after completing “La Casa de Bernarda Alba”.

Students enjoyed seeing the production and it helped them having a better understanding of the play and the Spanish reality of the 1930s.

“Lorca’s ‘La Casa de Bernarda Alba’, gave us an insightful experience into Spanish theatre and further reinforced our knowledge of Spanish culture. The brilliant acting allowed us to emotionally attach with the characters of the play, making the experience more memorable. This was my first time watching a play in Spanish and it convinced me that Spanish literature is rich in every way.” **Sonia**

They are now working on new projects which include starting a sign language course and raising money for a stall at Pride!


EQUALITIES, AND DIVERSITY CONFERENCE

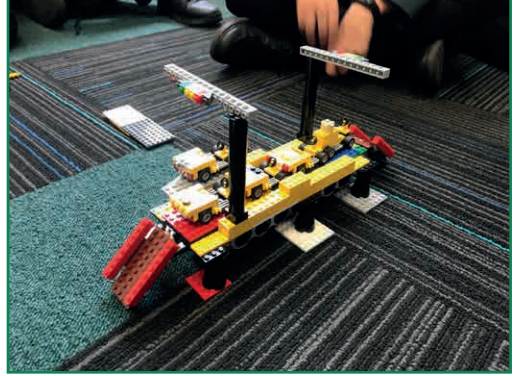
KEY STAGE 3 LEGO MINDSTORMS COMPETITION - WINNERS

On Tuesday, Ms Ball and I took six Key Stage 3 students to the Lego Mindstorms competition (organised by Tomorrow's Engineers). I'm delighted to say WE WON the competition out of all the London schools who took part. The students personified our PROUD values and also won the prize for the best teamwork!

There were five challenges we had to take part in:

1. Speed and Control Challenge (20 points): Teams raced their robot to cover the distance as quickly as possible and then returned home. They needed to be quick and controlled for this task - on our first attempt we came in at 30 seconds - during our second attempt we smashed this time and achieved 12 seconds!
2. Robot Challenge (40 points): Teams completed a range of exciting mat-based tasks. Teams had two chances to score as many points as possible on the table-top challenge - despite the first round not going as planned the second attempt went far better after some tweaks to our robot.
3. Robot Design (40 points): Teams presented their robots to judges in a show and tell style format and explained what they learnt about robot design and programming.
4. Project Presentation (40 points): Teams delivered a presentation they prepared answering the question 'How could engineers help future-proof the world?'. The students blew us away with the professionalism and confidence during the talk. It really felt like I was watching a university level group of students present their work.
5. Teamwork Challenge (40 points): This was an unseen challenge, they were reviewed on how well they worked as a team. The judge commented how much of a credit our students were to the school as they completed the task so well.

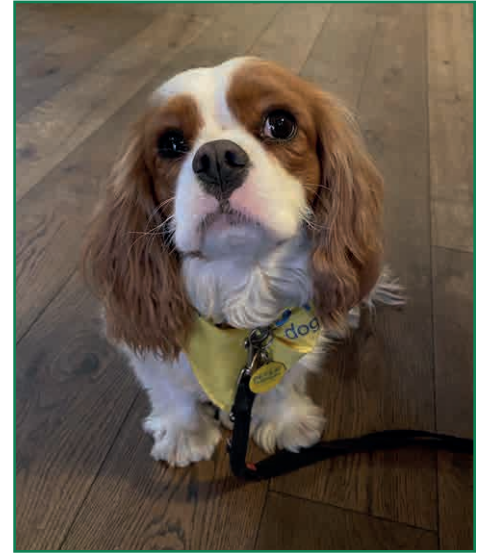
Now, we face the other UK finalists in Birmingham on Friday 13th March. Fingers crossed we win!

Diagnostic Text Week

As I hope you are aware, the diagnostic tests start next week from the 9th March for all of KS3. The diagnostic nature of these tests is to provide a bridge between the November and end of year assessments, allowing students to analyse their strengths and weaknesses with time to address them. Please support your child in revising for them so they can continue to grow their confidence and resilience.

Our plan as a Year 9 tutor team following these tests to prepare for the final exam in May is as follows:
25th March: Tutor team to meet and discuss key groups for interventions and specific Easter break work

to support students who are below expected progress in multiple subjects. Wednesday morning to be dedicated revision time for tutor groups with resources provided.

30th March: Year 9 to be reminded of online revision resources, exam timetable and the importance of having the correct equipment.

20th April: Tutor team to deliver extended revision focused health lessons.

5th May: KS3 Core Exams (Science, English, Maths)

11th May: KS3 Foundation Exams (All other exams)

Feedback from the previous approach to exams from parents and students was positive with areas for improvement:

- Of the 12 students who had maths intervention following BEP scores in Year 8, 8 moved up to achieving EP and 2 achieved AEP. Feedback from two students describe the intervention as 'really helpful' and 'the reason I've done better this time'.
- Parents raised issues about the clarity and quality of revision resources on the website. Whilst this will always act as a supplement to the resources provided in individual subjects and lessons, Mr Cheesbrough and I have started work to improve this.
- Student voice has been positive about having an exam timetable and having dedicated revision time in the mornings.
- I personally found the meetings with many of the year group to discuss progress and next steps really positive and affirming of the level of support at home for these young people.

The Sixth Form has had a big Apprenticeship focus over the last few weeks and twelve Year 13 students benefited hugely from an Assessment Centre Workshop held at school on Tuesday 25th February.

Assessment Centres form an increasingly important part of the selection criteria for apprenticeship providers and students from Chestnut Grove Sixth Form were treated to a real heads up about what to expect. Sarah Rolfe, a Business & HR professional and volunteer Enterprise Advisor through the Greater London Authority (GLA) led the session with support from Mr Tierney, our independent careers advisor at school.

Assessment Centres are used by companies looking to recruit degree apprentices and graduate entrants, where the emphasis is very much on seeing how applicants think, interact and respond to given scenarios which are purposely designed to tease out employability skills of teamwork, problem solving and leadership skills. In this way, employers and apprenticeship providers will target applicants who best evidence these desirable attributes.

The twelve Year 13 students then took part in a 'real' assessment task which gave them a practical business scenario to address and come forward with a solution. This was an incredibly useful experience and the students were told of the virtues praised and the vices condemned by assessors. The Year 13 students learned how best to set themselves up for success and picked up many handy tips to sell themselves and to shine while undergoing an assessment centre task.

Other key messages included:

- **Do your research** about the company before you arrive
- **Dress to impress** – look the part in smart professional attire
- **Be punctual** and in the right place at the right time (reliable)
- **Present your best self** – get involved, be proactive, contribute and listen carefully.
- **Show enthusiasm** throughout the task

All twelve Year 13 students involved received personal feedback on their overall performance in the group presentation which they had to contribute to. The best advice was to “be prepared to persevere”.

This is definitely a session we will want to replicate and run again in the future, encouraging every student to make the most of every opportunity to practice, practice and practice to improve both their 'soft' skills and their employability skills.

As with all things, with increased practice and familiarity comes increased confidence and self-assurance, allowing each applicant to thrive under pressure.
